5. Course Description: Develops understanding and skills concerning the broad concept of motor development across the life span.

7. Course Requirements (Evaluation & Grading):

<u>Examinations (100 points each X = 300 points)</u> - Students will be required to complete three (3) examinations during the semester. Examinations consist of a series of multiple choice, true/false, short answer, and matching questions.

"Hot Topics" (Current Events, 10 points each X2 = 20 points) – Each class period four students will present a "Hot Topics" both oral and written (this oral presentation should take between 3 - 5 minutes to present and each is worth 10 points). Students will be assigned to a group and will present on their assigned group day. Only students will an excused absent will be allowed to make up the topic (i.e., medical illness or emergency and University-approved events event requires the student to miss class). All other absences will receive a 0 points for the hot topics.

Final (Group) Course Project (70 points)

Students will be required to complete a course projects in small groups. This assignment is designed to provide the opportunity to apply motor development concepts obtained throughout the course. [70 points]. Students can choose from 4 options.

Discussion Postings (10 points each X 3 = 30 points)

throughout the course there will be 3 opportunities for students to respond to questions posed by the teacher through Blackboard discussion posting. The response to be an application of the content learned in the course and through outside sources. A practice posting will be completion prior to the first assigned discussion posting.
