1. Course Number: KINE 8900

Course Title: Directed Studies

(Hypoxia and VO₂ on-kinetics; Cancer and Lactate)

Credit Hours: 3

Prerequisite: Instructor approval

Corequisite: None

Instructor: L. Bruce Gladden

2. Text: None. Various research papers will be used.

- **3. Course Description:** Detailed reading and review of scientific articles related to Hypoxia and VO₂ on-kinetics, and continuing work on the topic of Cancer and Lactate. There will also be active research activity.
- 4. Course Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will:
 - 1. Have presented a poster on Hypoxia and VO_2 on-kinetics.
 - 2. Analyzed data on lactate infusion and metabolism.
- **5. Course Content and Schedule:** The course involves in-depth study of the chosen topics. The student will meet with Dr. Gladden on a weekly basis to a) select scientific articles to be read, and b) to review and discuss articles that have already been read, c) to summarize articles read, d) to do research in the selected areas, and to report progress on the poster presentation.

6. Course Requirements/Evaluation:

The course requirements include reading scientific articles and summarizing/synthesizing them in the form of oral discussion and a poster, and also analyzing research data.

7. Class Schedule

Weekly one-on-one discussion/presentation sessions, and research sessions.
