**Course Description**: Interdisciplinary instruction appropriate for children's developmental characteristics integrating music content, professional resources, curriculum goals and instructional strategies with broader curriculum objectives.

#### Course Objectives: The student will --

- develop confidence in basic music concepts and skills from a teaching perspective.
- identify goals for music in curriculum and teaching.
- select, implement, and evaluate a variety of instructional strategies for music education, including appropriate instructional technology.
- develop basic knowledge of how to model, teach, and integrate multicultural awareness, acceptance, and appreciation and how to obtain and use information about cultural and community diversity and resources for music instruction.
- prepare interdisciplinary instruction in music based upon curriculum goals appropriate for students'
  developmental characteristics to stimulate critical and creative thinking skills and encourage students to
  recognize, question, and interpret ideas from a variety of perspectives.
- collaborate with colleagues to organize, allocate, and manage the resources of time, space, and activities
  in laboratory experiences with children and music and to develop appropriate classroom management
  strategies.
- evaluate one's performance as a teacher and assess learning in music in settings with diverse school populations.
- develop a personal philosophy about the teaching of music and arts in the elementary school.
- develop music leadership skills for the classroom.

• Points will be deducted (1 letter grade per day) for unexcused late assignments. However, all requirements must be completed to pass the course.

<u>School Observation Report:</u> Each student will e-mail the instructor a brief report concerning their first impressions of the lab setting.

<u>Laboratory Lesson Plans:</u> Each teaching group will prepare and revise detailed lesson plans for their field experiences.

<u>Teaching Self Evaluations:</u> Each student will e-mail the instructor following each teaching lab a brief report concerning her/his teaching experience.

<u>Music Performance Proficiency Exams:</u> Each student will demonstrate the following proficiencies during class.

- "Recycled Materials" Instrument Ensemble
  - o Team of 2 4 people
  - o Each team member must create her/his own unique musical instrument from recycled items
  - o Demonstrate appropriate (standards-based) classroom use in class performance
- Song Leading with Autoharp or Keyboard
  - o Team of 2 people
  - o Each team member must actively lead at least one verse of selected song
  - o Both team members must accompany on Autoharp or Keyboard throughout entire song
- Folk Song Duet with Recorder & Guitar OR Recorder and Keyboard
- Folk Dance or Rhythmic Movement
  - o Team of 4 people
  - o Each team member must actively teach at least one aspect of the dance
  - All team members must actively participate in demonstration of appropriate (standards-based) classroom use of activity

Written Exams: Exams will cover content from readings and class discussions.

<u>Final Teacher's Resource Notebook\*:</u> Your final project will be a Teacher's Resource Notebook containing an organized collection of media, materials, and activity ideas.

- Select a multicultural theme and grade level.
- Type a cover page which includes your name, the date, the grade level, and a description of the selected theme.
- Provide a detailed Table of Contents

- Select appropriate materials for your multicultural unit including at least: 6 songs, 3 recordings, 3 art prints, 3 literature selections (books and/or poems), and either 1 drama activity OR 1 dance activity to go along with the selected culture and grade level.
- For each item in Section 3, type a description of how the material would be used in the classroom. In the description, explain how it would relate to the following curricular areas: Social Studies, Language Arts, Physical Education, Mathematics, Science, Character Education, Computer Education, Foreign Language. (1 or 2 for each item).
- Choose two items from Section #3 and for each provide one example of a visual chart and/or use of manipulatives to accompany the lesson activity described in Section #5.
- Complete a detailed self-evaluation and include with the final project.
- Complete bibliography divided into the following sections: songs, recordings (instrumental listening selections), art prints, books and poems, additional related arts connection. Be sure to include any materials obtained on-line.

\*Note: You are encouraged to include electronic materials with this notebook. These materials must be saved on media (e.g., burned on CD or DVD) and included with the notebook.

#### **Final Model Lesson Demo:**

Students will form small groups (2 – 4 people) to plan and implement a model lesson. Evaluation criteria will include:

- Detailed lesson plan
- Standards-based
- Musicality
- Evidence of Creativity
- Appropriate integration of other content
- Lively, engaging demo of lesson in class presentation
- Both peer and self assessment will be considered in grading this project.

### **Class Policy Statements:**

<u>Participation.</u> Students are expected to participate in all class discussions and participate in all exercises, including field experiences and observations. It is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor if assignment deadlines are not met. Students are responsible for initiating arrangements for missed work. Participation includes your willingness to contribute thoughts and ideas during class discussions, make music, work in groups, teach, and give project presentations.

Attendance/Absences: Attendance is required at each class meeting. If an exam is missed, a make-up exam will be given only for University-approved excuses as outlined in the *Student Policy eHandbook* www.auburn.edu/studentpolicies. Arrangement to take the make-up exam must be made in advance. Students who miss an exam because of illness need a doctor's statement for verification of sickness and should clear the absence with the instructor the day they return to class. Other unavoidable absences from campus must be documented and cleared with the instructor in advance. Five points will be deducted from the final grade for every unexcused absence or two tardies (or early departures from class), except in the case of documented illness. Students may request one personal day scheduled with the instructor except when they are scheduled for an exam, proficiency, or teaching. Note: Appointments for routine medical and dental checkups, social events (including weddings) are not considered excused absences.

**Unannounced guizzes:** There will be no unannounced guizzes.
