#### Course Assessments:

There are four components to the grading of this class.

\*Miscellaneous Technology Assignments (multiple assignments at various point amounts each which will equal 50 possible points towards your total final grade):

• These assignments will be given throughout the semester as part of an effort to expose students to new and relevant content (i.e., readings, surveys, etc.).

\*Tests (4 tests at 10% each which equals 40 possible points towards your total final grade):

- Students will complete 4 tests/quizzes during the semester related to course content.
- Text content will be drawn directly from designated course lectures and presentations.
- See the specific policy (below) about make up tests.

\*Labs (5 assignments at 10 points each which equals 50 possible points towards your final grade):

- There will a lab assignment relating to the content skill topic.
- Submission will be through Canvas (unless otherwise informed). Submissions received from other e-mail accounts will not be accepted.
- Always perform the lab work logged in under your id.
- Labs submitted after the due date will not be graded. If you wait until the
  last minute to complete the assignments, computer/technical problem WILL
  occur. Now that you know this, it is no longer considered a legitimate excuse.
- All students will retain computer copies of their work

\*Technology Portfolio (this assignment is worth 30 possible points towards your total final grade):

- Student will submit, as a final project, an electronic portfolio which highlights their skills and perspectives on technology and how it can effectively be used to enhance instruction and the field of kinesiology.
- An outline of this projects requirements and format will be given and discussed at the mid-point of the semester.

<u>Instructional presentation</u> (this assignment is worth 30 possible points towards your total final grade):

- Students will give a 12-minute group presentation using a variety of instructional strategies. Emphasis will be on
  - o quality of audiovisual materials
  - o professionalism of the presenters
  - o dynamic qualities of the presentation
  - o voice quality and presentation
- Presentation is graded according to the *Presentation Evaluation Rubric*
- Exactly **24 hours** prior to presentation time, email your PowerPoint presentation to your instructor.

**Participation:** Students are expected to constructively participate in all class exercises.

**Attendance & Punctuality:** Attendance is required at each class meeting. Each unexcused absence, **beyond one**, will result in a deduction of **5%** from the student's *final grade*. Each late arrival (tardy) will lose **1%** from the student's *final grade*.

- **1.** *Unexcused absences cannot be made up.*
- **2.** Students must inform instructor of any excused absences before they occur (see Auburn University Student Policy eHandbook).
- 3. Students must provide a proof for excused absences no later than next class meeting.
- **4.** All excused assignments must be completed by date given.

Also, class sessions begin promptly. If a student is absent on the day of a scheduled test, lab, presentation or other graded assignment, s/he forfeits her/his right to complete it and will, as such, receive a failing grade of "F". This does not apply, however, to students who are absent due to University affiliated events or excused absences.

### Make up policy -- missed labs and test:

- Make-up test and labs will be allowed only with approved excuses.
- In all cases, students must complete the make-up test on the set date. These dates will be notified to the individual student.
- Students who fail to attend a test/lab session (see Lecture Outline for dates) without reasonable excuse will not be permitted to make up that test/lab.
