Course Title: Practicum in Area of Specialization: Foreign Language Education - Spanish

Texts:

Textbooks and/or other resources (journals, research monographs, unpublished research, etc.) are selected as appropriate to the individual practicum topics.

Course Descriptions:

This two-week exchange is open to five teachers preparing for graduate degrees in the teaching of Spanish or English Language Learners at Universidad Nacional and at Auburn University. Teachers will 1) observe and reflect on methodologies for teaching modern languages at different levels in a variety of school settings, 2) observe daily life in the target culture through a homestay with a local family in Heredia, Costa Rica or Auburn, Alabama, 3) become familiar with Heredia or Auburn and their surrounding areas, and 4) investigate a specific topic to be determined on a yearly basis.

Course Objectives:

Students will:

- 1. Develop materials for classroom use based on authentic sources obtained in Costa Rica.
- 2. Visit schools and observe classes chosen by the director of the program in Costa Rica (See agenda below)
- 3. Keep a daily journal of their impressions of family life and school visits as well as the important sites that they visit
- 4. Read articles and previously prepared sample materials to serve as guides for their curriculum development project.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Complete all paperwork for Auburn University Study Abroad Programs
- 2. Meet with your professor on a daily basis while in Costa Rica.
- 3. Identify topics for curriculum development and obtain approval from the professor.
- 4. Submit completed pedagogical materials either in person or electronically.
- 5. Submit daily journal with impressions of family life and school visits with a short description of your daily activities and reflections for each day.

Checkpoints for completion of requirements are as follows:

- 1. Day One Orientation meeting obtain approval of ideas for curriculum development
- 2. All week days meet with AU professor at Universidad Nacional UNA or in schools to go over any problems concerning ideas for curriculum development project.
- 3. Day 15 Submit completed materials and journals to AU professor or within five days of returning to the United States.
