Course Description:

This course is designed for students to learn basic concepts and activities associated with the maintenance of physical fitness in weight control. Strategies for developing physical activity regimens and making proper nutritional selections will also be discussed.

• This class will be comprised of days devoted to lecturing/discussion and days devoted to physical activity. Students are expected to actively participate in all activities throughout the class period. If you exhibit inappropriate behavior you will be asked to leave the class and will be counted as absent day. Repeated incidents may result in expulsion from the class. Additionally, appropriate dress is required in order to get credit for participation. Appropriate dress includes athletic shoes that are non-marking, athletic shorts or pants, and t-shirt. Cell phones and all electronic devices must be turned off before class. If you are expecting an important call, please let me know before class. If you are working on an electronic device during class, you will be counted as absent.

Class Policy Statements:

A. Physical Activity and Wellness Program (PAWP) Attendance Policy: The material and experiences in this class are important and if you are not in class, you cannot take an active role as a student. Class attendance and appropriate participation are paramount to your success as a student. At the discretion of the instructor, students arriving tardy to class will lose 1% of their final grade per offense. Unexcused absences cannot be made up and will result in up to 3% deduction from the student's final grade per absence. Once a student has accrued five (5) unexcused absences he/she will not be permitted to take the final examination and will receive a grade of FA (as stipulated by the Physical Activity and Wellness Program guidelines). Moreover, students who accrue eight (8) absences, (excused, unexcused or a combination of the two types) will not be permitted to take the final examination and will receive a grade of FA. If an unusual condition such as a serious illness results in this situation (8 total absences) students are encouraged to consult the AU Bulletin and/or an academic advisor in their college to determine if they meet university guidelines for requesting withdrawal from the course. Excused absences will be treated as follows:

a. Students must provide the instructor with a valid excuse upon returning to class (refer to Auburn University's policy concerning class attendance and excused/unexcused absences): and

^{*}To earn the participation points students must <u>attend</u> class on time, <u>dress</u> appropriately, and <u>actively</u> take part in class activities.

b. Make-up work developed and assigned at the discretion of the instructor must be completed within a week of the student returning to class.

If the student fails to follow these instructions the excused absence in question will be calculated as an unexcused absence. There are times when unforeseen circumstances will not allow you to attend class. Exceptions to this policy due to extreme circumstances are only permitted with the professor's timely knowledge and approval. Arrangements to make up missed assignments and examinations due to properly authorized excused absences shall be initiated by the student within a week of the excused absence as mandated by Auburn University. Again, the format of any make-up work/assignments will be at the instructor's discretion. Finally, the instructor will address all issues concerning absences at his/her discretion. Students are encouraged to refer to Auburn University's policies concerning attendance, absences, academic honesty, and make-up work as found in the Auburn University Student Policy eHandbook. B. Excused absences: Students are granted excused absences from class for the following reasons: illness of the student or serious illness of a member of the student's immediate family, the death of a member of the student's immediate family, trips for student organizations sponsored by an academic unit, trips for university classes, trips for participation in intercollegiate athletic events, subpoena for a court appearance, and religious holidays. Students who wish to have an excused absence from class for any other reason must contact the instructor in advance of the absence to request permission. The instructor will weigh the merits of the request and render a decision. When feasible, the student must notify the instructor prior to the occurrence of any excused absences, but in no case shall such notification occur more than one week after the absence. Appropriate documentation for all excused absences is required.

C. <u>Make-Up Policy</u>: Arrangement to make up a missed major examination (e.g., hour exams, midterm exams) due to properly authorized excused absences must be initiated by the student within one week of the end of the period of the excused absences(s). Except in unusual circumstances, such as the continued absence of the student or the advent of university holidays, a make-up exam will take place within two weeks of the date that the student initiates arrangements for it. Except in extraordinary circumstance, no make-up exams will be arranged during the last three days before the final exam period begins.

D. <u>Academic Honesty Policy</u>: All portions of the Auburn University student academic honesty code (Title XII) found in the *AU Student Policy eHandbook* will apply to university courses. All academic honesty violations or alleged violations of the SGA Code of Laws will be reported to the Office of the Provost, which will then refer the case to the Academic Honesty Committee.

E. <u>Disability Accommodations</u>: Students who need accommodations are asked to electronically submit their approved accommodations through AU Access and to arrange a meeting during office hours the first week of classes, or as soon as possible if accommodations are needed immediately.
