Course Description:

Program, organization, and development of basic and supplementary materials for guiding teachers, faculties and school systems in the continuous improvement of curriculum and teaching practices. Topics include historical foundations, philosophical and psychological foundations, administration, budget, and advocacy for public school music programs.

Course Objectives:

The student will be able to:

- 1. Describe important milestones in the history of public school music education in the United states
- 2. Discuss changing attitudes toward music education since the 1950s
- 3. Summarize key national reports on American education and their impact upon music education
- 4. Describe the most prominent philosophies of music education
- 5. Discuss the role of the federal government in arts education policy and practice
- 6. Critique research reports linking music education with gains in other academic subjects
- 7. Develop a research-based argument supporting music education in the public schools
- 8. Discuss administrative aspects of the public school music program
- 9. Develop a detailed budget for a public school music program
- 10. Develop a strategic plan for adding a music program to a public school or school system
