Course Description: Research formulated, planned, conducted, evaluated, and reported in appropriate written and oral formats under the direction of the student's major professor.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

Formulate, plan, conduct, and report in appropriate written and oral formats original research under the direction of the student's major professor.

Course Content Outline: Course content will follow the sequencing of objectives and course requirements.

Students submit weekly reports via TigerMail reporting progress and attaching agreed documents. Students meet with the professor in bi-weekly individual appointments in person or via Wimba Live Classroom. Additional appointments are scheduled via TigerMail or phone.

Students will meet with professor in person, or via ichat (or other electronic format) bi-weekly to discuss progress on document/proposal/dissertation.

Weeks 1-2 Meet to Discuss current project progress/or to create a plan for new semester's work.

Weeks 3-4 Meet to discuss progress.

Weeks 5-6 Student(s) will submit updated work on document. Meet to discuss work submitted.

Weeks 7-8 Meet to discuss progress.

Weeks 9-10 Student(s) will submit updated work on document. Meet to discuss work submitted.

Weeks 11-12 Meet to discuss progress.

Weeks 13-15 Student(s) will submit updated work on document. Meet to discuss work submitted and progress.

Students will attend Doctoral Seminars as scheduled by Program Coordinator, or designee.

Assignments/Projects: Students are required to complete the following components/activities:

- A. Compile an extensive review of the pertinent literature
- B. Identify and state research questions(s)
- C. Formulate an appropriate research methodology including data analysis
- D. Prepare a research proposal and obtain the approval of the student's graduate advisory committee
- E. Obtain Institutional Review Board approval for research dealing with human subjects
- F. Conduct the proposed research with the concurrence and guidance of the student's graduate advisory committee
- G. Analyze the data and interpret the findings
- H. Write the manuscript following approved guidelines
- I. Defend orally the research, findings, and conclusions

Rubric and Grading Scale: No grades are assigned to the Dissertation.

Class Policy Statements:
