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#### ENROLLED, An Act,

To make appropriations for the ordinary expenses of the executive, legislative and judicial agencies of the State, for other functions of government, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. The monies in Section 2 are appropriated from the named funds for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to the state agencies indicated, as the amounts to be used to pay the expenditures of the named agencies, and are in lieu of all monies appropriated for these purposes in other sections of the Alabama Statutes.

For the purpose of this act, the amounts herein for expenditures are listed by programmatic area and the totals for all programs are shown by the source of funds. It is intended that only the herein named funds be appropriated in the amounts specified to the named agencies and that the following definitions shall be applicable.

"Appropriation Total" shall mean the aggregate total of all fund sources.

"Program" shall mean specific governmental services 24 required to achieve a specific objective. A program shall be 25

directed to meeting the need of an identified clientele, or group of recipients or beneficiaries, and shall be expended only for such purposes.

"Capital Outlay" shall mean expenditures which result in the acquisition and/or addition to items, such as land or buildings, which have an appreciable and calculable period of usefulness in excess of one year, and shall be expended only for such purposes.

"Debt Service" shall mean an expenditure for the payment of interest and principal on bonded debt obligations of the State, and shall be expended only for such purposes.

"Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated the amounts set forth herein for the ordinary expenses of the executive, legislative, and judicial agencies of the State, for other functions of government, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012, to be paid out of any monies hereinafter specified, from such other funds and accounts as may be designated, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the total amount to be expended for the items for which the appropriation is herein made shall not exceed the amount provided therefor, except as provided in the Budget Management Act of 1976, Sections

41-19-1 through 41-19-12, Code of Alabama 1975. Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any pay period
which has been or may be established by the Legislature for
the payment of salaries of state employees, the entire payment
due shall be made from the fiscal year's appropriation in
which the pay date falls.

Section 4. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated such amounts as may be necessary for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012, to the Retirement Systems of Alabama from the Senior Services Trust Fund to comply with Section 41-15C-1, Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 5. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby conditionally appropriated any and all amounts from tobacco settlement or litigation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012. The amounts are conditioned upon the State of Alabama receiving revenue from tobacco settlement or litigation and upon the recommendation of the Director of Finance, the Chairs of the House Ways and Means General Fund Committee, the Senate

Finance and Taxation-General Fund Committee, and the approval of the Governor. The conditional appropriation made herein shall be allocated pursuant to Sections 41-10-620 through 41-10-639 and Sections 41-15B-1 through 41-15B-6, Code of Alabama 1975.

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Section 6. Except as may be herein otherwise provided, amounts herein specifically appropriated shall be in lieu of the amounts heretofore provided or appropriated by law for such purposes. The amounts herein appropriated are the maximum amounts to be expended for the purposes herein designated and in no event shall the maximum expenditure provided for any items of expense exceed the amount allocated herein except as may be provided for under Sections 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 12, and 13 of this bill, as provided in the Budget Management Act of 1976, Sections 41-19-1 et seq., Code of Alabama 1975, and those appropriations herein made, except appropriations to the Alabama Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the purchase of alcoholic beverages, are and shall be subject to the terms, conditions, provisions and limitations of Sections 41-4-80 et seq., Code of Alabama 1975, and the Budget Management Act of 1976, Sections 41-19-1 et seg., Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 7. Any surplus remaining in any appropriation herein made from the State General Fund to any office, department, bureau, board, commission or agency may be

transferred, on order of the Governor, to any other appropriation herein made from the State General Fund when such appropriation to any office, department, bureau, board, commission or agency is insufficient to pay salaries in that office, department, bureau, board, commission or agency.

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Section 8. In addition to appropriations herein made, all gifts, grants, insurance proceeds, contributions or entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in the bill, including grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties, to any department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the fund established by Section 41-5-24, Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 9. Upon certification to the Director of Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or commission from the appropriate fund or funds of such department, board, bureau or commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon the availability of funds and a determination by the Director of Finance that existing appropriations are not available for the court-ordered payments.

Section 10. All interest earned from funds paid into Account No. 0396 by Act 87-761, Act 88-947, Act 89-79, Act 90-556 and Act 91-572 are hereby appropriated to the Governor's Contingency Fund to be spent at the discretion of the Governor. Any other interest earned by the state from Revenue Sharing Investments under the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, Public Law 92-512, 92nd Congress, together with any accruals or reversions thereon are hereby appropriated to the State General Fund.

Section 11. All encumbered balances of a previous fiscal year appropriation, other than the exclusions authorized by this Act or in Section 41-4-93, Code of Alabama

1975, shall lapse no later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made and shall revert to the credit of the State General Fund or earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations were made.

Section 12. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies are hereby directed to make the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in said amounts enumerated in this act. All agencies enumerated in this act and receiving services from other governmental agencies enumerated in this act shall make full payment in a timely manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such services.

Section 13. All unencumbered balances of all appropriations from the State General Fund for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011, shall revert to the State Treasury at the end of the fiscal year to the credit of the State General Fund and will not be reappropriated for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2011, unless otherwise provided for in this act or state statutes.

Section 14. All funds collected under Section 40-12-43.1 between the effective date of Act 98-191 and September 30, 2010 are hereby appropriated to the Auburn

University Center for Governmental Services for the
administration of the examiner certification program
established by the Alabama Local Tax Institute of Standards
and Training as provided in Section 40-12-43.1.

Section 15. It is the intent of the Legislature that the funds appropriated to the Office of the Senate President Pro Tempore in subsection 9 of Section 2A of this act which are not otherwise designated may be expended by the Senate President Pro Tempore for the same purposes as are authorized for the Lieutenant Governor pursuant to Section 29-4-50 Code of Alabama 1975, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to Section 29-4-60 Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 16. If merit pay increases are reinstated after December 31, 2011, current anniversary dates will be maintained for all state employees. Agencies are prohibited from adjusting employee anniversary dates to obtain merit pay increases at an earlier date.

Section 17. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include the amounts necessary to pay the State Employee Health Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$765 per month for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain

the aforementioned fixed rate. For the fiscal year 2012, the Governor upon the recommendation of the State Director of Finance, shall have the authority to increase the SEIB monthly employer insurance premium rate up to a maximum of \$805 per month for each full-time employee.

Section 18. It is the intent of the Legislature that the Director of Finance shall notify the Chair of the House Ways and Means General Fund Committee, the Chair of the Senate Finance and Taxation-General Fund Committee, and the Legislative Fiscal Officer of any interagency transfers, of any type, including contracting, of any of the funds appropriated in this act.

Section 19. In the appropriation in this Act to the Alabama Department of Public Health, the reference to Prostate Screening and Research refers to research performed at the Mitchell Cancer Institute. Of the above appropriation for Prostate Screening and Research, \$300,000 shall go to the Mitchell Cancer Institute with \$250,000 earmarked for cystic fibrosis research and \$50,000 for prostate cancer research.

Section 20. In addition to the amounts appropriated above, there is hereby appropriated to the Unified Judicial System the amount of up to \$5,000,000 from the Alabama Capital Improvement Trust Fund for the Fiscal Year ending September 30, 2012. This appropriation is conditioned upon the availability of funds in the Alabama Capital Improvement Trust

Fund, the recommendation of the Finance Director, and the approval of the Governor.

The Legislature hereby finds that such expenditures for capital improvements in the technology used to electronically store the state court system's records and the economical operation of the Alabama court system are necessary and appropriate in that:

- a. The State's Unified Judicial System operates the State Judicial Information System ("SJIS") as the electronic database upon which all the state's court system records are stored, retrieved, accessed and distributed.
- b. SJIS provides the means for all departments and agencies of state government; all law enforcement personnel and agencies; all court officials and officers, including judges, circuit clerks, and others; all attorneys; and all members of the general public to access, file, research, store, and retrieve state court records, information, and documents.
- c. The equipment and software currently used by the UJS to store and maintain this data are two outdated mainframe computers operating on software programs written in an outdated programming code; both these mainframe computers and software are ill-suited for these purposes, are increasingly inefficient, lack critical capabilities and flexibility, require duplication of effort in many areas to operate and

maintain, and render the system difficult and overly expensive to maintain and operate.

d. The cost of a system of server computers and the other computer hardware and software necessary to transition from this current mainframe computer system and to modernize the state's electronic database for court records is estimated to be five million dollars.

Beside increasing the capabilities and flexibility of the state judicial system's electronic database, the replacement of these mainframe computers with a system of modern computer servers would result in saving the state approximately \$750,000 every year in maintenance and operations costs alone.

Section 219.04 of the Alabama Constitution which created the Capital Improvement Trust Fund, states the Fund's purpose in Section I to be as follows:

The Legislature finds that the capital improvements and technology required by many governmental programs would be more efficiently funded through the establishment of a special trust fund dedicated to funding such improvements.

The replacement of the hardware and software used to store, access and distribute the state's court system records is precisely the type of capital investment in information technology for which the Capital Improvement Trust Fund was created and for which it was intended to provide funding.
