- Advocate for the rights of individual faculty members through Committee A.



CURRENT AND RECENT ISSUES

- Use and interpretation of the Faculty Handbook, particularly the interface between handbook policies pertaining to faculty members and HR policies and procedures.
- New social media screening policy.
- Advocacy for COLA and merit increases in the wake of high inflation.
- Continued advocacy for the rights of individual faculty members through Committee A, including due process concerns.

AAUP SUPPORTS ACADEMIC FREEDOM:

The common good depends upon the free search for truth and its free exposition. Academic freedom is essential to these purposes and applies to both teaching and research. Freedom in research is fundamental to the advancement of truth. Academic freedom . . . is fundamental for the protection of the rights of the teacher in teaching and of the student in learning.

AAUP SUPPORTS SHARED GOVERNANCE:

The variety and complexity of the tasks performed by institutions of higher education produce an inescapable interdependence among governing board, administration, faculty, students, and others. The relationship calls for adequate communication among these components, and full opportunity for appropriate joint planning and effort. . . . Effective planning demands that the broadest possible exchange of information and opinion should be the rule for communication among the components of a college or university.

COMMITTEE A

Comprises three tenured full professors, Committee A advocates for faculty who believe their rights to academic freedom and due process have been infringed upon. Committee A receives complaints of departures from these core AAUP principles and, where appropriate, undertakes formal investigations. Such investigations may lead to a recommendation from the committee to the university administration, up to and including the president of the university.

HOWZE ACADEMIC FREEDOM AWARD

The Glenn Howze Academic Freedom Award is presented annually to a person who has demonstrated high ethical standards and professionalism in his or her field of specialization and has also made significant contributions to advocating, protecting and extending academic freedom at the university.
