

Janus v. AFSCME Council 31


Question: must nonunion members, who share in wages, benefits, and protections under collective bargaining contracts, pay union dues

Ruling: No

Implications for AAUP: Significant loss of revenue

Consequences for AAUP: Restructuring

Restructuring



Biennial Meeting

Each chapter has the right to send one delegate/250 members, up to a maximum of 10 delegates per chapter

The more delegates a chapter has, the more "strength" their votes will have

Delegates must be voted upon by secret ballot by chapter membership, including officers, unless there is only one candidate
